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a Letter from our Executive Director



Greetings fellow Earth Lovers, from Barbara Schlitt Ford, grateful Executive Director of our treasured Environmental Learning Center.

I'm sharing this message to give you a glimpse of this past fiscal year from our inside perspective.

Recall that I joined the ELC as Interim ED April 2018 and became the permanent ED in September 2018. In my first year at the helm, together we made great strides toward a flourishing future for the ELC.

This fiscal year was off to a great start in terms of increased program attendance as well as campus visitors, improved metrics tracking, and creative new offerings. We were poised to have a stellar year. About 1/3 of this 7/1/19-6/30/20 fiscal year ended up being derailed by the pandemic. Never one to make excuses, we made the best of the challenging situation. I just want to paint for you a mental vision of our path.

We had announced the pledge that would make possible the creation of the first key piece of our master plan, the Education and Event Pavilion. The community was excited about what this new venue would mean for us all. Just prior to the unwelcome arrival of COVID in March 2020, the ELC hosted a smashingly successful EcoFest with over 1200 attendees. The campus was buzzing with happy folks of all ages enjoying being in the great outdoors and learning more about this fascinating natural world that surrounds us. There was seining and pond dip netting, pontoon/canoe/kayak tours, a drum circle, nature crafts, guided walks, a roster of adult lectures and workshops, and loads of guests enjoying our two nature art collections and our 1500 gallons of aquaria and touch tank, and Discovery Station interactive exhibits. In the Lagoon Room, youth were thoroughly enjoying the hands-on STEAM activity center. Families and friends were exploring our miles of trails and boardwalks. Purchases were being made in our Nature Nook eco-boutique. Our amazing cadre of volunteers was everywhere to assist. It was a huge success in every way.

Likewise in January 2020, we hosted our signature fundraising event Mangroves and Moonlight. Generous supporters raved about how many wonderful things were going on at the ELC and how excited they were for the future. We had completed our 3rd-grade field trips and everyone had a blast and took home critical new knowledge about their connection to our environment and why we should all care about and protect its health.

a Letter from our Executive Director

We were in the midst of our 4th-grade field trips when the news of this community health crisis was revealed.

In February 2020 we had just hosted our brainchild, the first Indian River CARES Nonprofit Leaders Coalition - a Valentine's Day appreciation lunch for the Executive Directors of our fellow philanthropic organizations in the county. CARES stands for Connect, Advocate, Renew, Educate and Strategize. This amazing group of leaders, that does so much to improve the quality of life for so many here, vowed to come together quarterly so they could be knowledgeable about what the other nonprofits were doing and collaborate wherever possible. Little did they know at the time that just a few weeks later they would decide to meet virtually weekly while they supported each other through this unbelievably challenging time to help one another reach the other side. "Together, we are better."

As we all know, in March 2020 everything came to a screeching halt as we did everything we could to protect the health of our staff, volunteers, and visitors. As soon as it was safe to do so, we opened the outdoor campus so that the community had a safe place where they could physically distance themselves outdoors. Waiving our fees seemed like the right thing to do. This was a gift to our residents - the gift of our most valuable asset, our 64 acres of wild Florida habitat on an island in the middle of the Indian River Lagoon.

We cinched our belts and extended our hands. We trimmed our annual budget by 25%. We unbelievably did more with less. Staff worked remotely on slightly reduced hours; volunteers stayed home and hunkered down like the rest of the country. ELC leadership delivered nature puzzles to the nursing homes and assisted living facilities with notes of cheer to let them know they were in our thoughts and hearts. We reached out to our donors and members to see what we could do to help.

Summer camps were sadly canceled. The staff got busy creating new and innovative ways to continue the ELC mission through our unique Nature Near You Kits and virtual outreach programs for schools, fellow nonprofits, and the community at large. Many were provided free of charge.

With the focus shifted from profitability to easing the burden for the community in whatever way we could, we were fortunate to receive PPP assistance and continued donor support while drawing on our Foundation reserves to see us through. Next fiscal year's annual report will reflect much of the same. But we rallied, just as the rest of the country did. We repositioned our efforts toward what was most helpful and important for society.

a Letter from our Executive Director

Globally, the importance of a healthy environment was being spotlighted. Stories about signs of ecosystem recovery as a direct result of the reduced human population stressors of industrial plants and vehicle emissions were spreading hope. People slowed down, planted gardens, spent time with loved ones, and appreciated how convenient their former lives had been.

Businesses (including nonprofit businesses) had to figure out a way to survive if not thrive. While it was certainly disappointing to not end the fiscal year in the healthy financial position we had envisioned and had strategically planned for, we were among the fortunate to firmly survive. We took the time provided to fix up our lovingly worn-for-decades campus, and continued our plans for the brighter days we knew to lay ahead.

We are stronger because of this challenge and we are so deeply grateful to our supporters who have helped us through.

Please know that the ELC is here for you and we look forward to seeing you when you want to relax, celebrate, connect, explore, ponder or grow. We hope that you will think of us as an extension of your own backyard.

Thank you for joining us as we recommit to fostering awareness of the interconnectedness of all things. We strive to instill the understanding that when we humans fail to protect and nurture such a critical aspect of our world as our natural resources that we all rely on to live, the ramifications are severe and life-threatening. Eyes and ears are being opened to this important message. The ELC is here to support our individual and collective convictions to act differently, now, while we can still turn the tide for the health of our shared environment.

adapting to the new normal

Nothing could have prepared the staff and volunteers for the challenges faced by the Environmental Learning Center (ELC) after March 2020 and the COVID-19 pandemic. Doors were abruptly closed. Parking lots suddenly were empty. The boats remained tied to their docks. The ELC became eerily still, absent from the daily activity of staff, students, and volunteers. There was no sound of children laughing or of our nature guides leading inquisitive guests through our lush campus. The phones went silent and our doors remained locked. But not for long.

The innovative team quickly pivoted to virtual education and focused on campus improvements. The solitude was short-lived as the leadership team of the ELC simultaneously formulated a strategic plan to re-open the campus. They knew that the ELC provided a much needed safe-haven for the community. At the ELC our family, friends, neighbors and visitors could experience the many therapeutic benefits of nature so desperately needed, especially during this time of uncertainty. Slowly and methodically the campus safely re-opened. The ELC offered its treasures using innovative planning:

- Free admission during the months of March-June, provided guests the opportunity to safely social distance outdoors and experience the healing and therapeutic benefits of nature.
- Lagoon Island Family Adventures created safe, hands-on educational adventures in the absence of summer camps.
- Nature Near You Kits provided at home educational activities for hundreds of children.
- Virtual Events were created to connect people to nature from the security of their homes.
- Through our scholarship programs, families in need were able to participate in programs both virtually and on campus.




Splash Pad

Wet and wild fun at the ELC Fundraising Goal: \$150,000

The splash pad will be the "coolest" addition to the new Thomas R. Schidel Education and Event Pavilion and Oval, allowing children and families to cool off in sprinklers and spouts bursting with water.

The envisioned splash pad will be situated right in front of the pavilion stage and will also act as an entertaining fountain during performances. The mosaic front wall of the stage will be an educational art display of life in the Indian River Lagoon, allowing children to be immersed in a watery world.









Greening the new pavilion. Fundraising Goal: \$20,000 per wall or \$35,000 for both walls

The new Thomas R. Schidel Education and Event Pavilion is envisioned to have two sides of living walls. The living walls, made of native plants, will be both an environmentally friendly addition to the building and a teaching tool for the community to learn the benefits of greening structures.

Living walls are a veritcal built structure intentially covered with vegetation. They help to remove air pollutants, provide shade and thermal benefits to buildings, improve biodiversity, attenuate rain water and improve a sense of well-being.
